"Our definition of vacation isn't lying on the beach"

Eric and Matthew Gilbertson want to climb the highest point in every country in the world. What helps: luck, bribes - and sometimes a packed lunch for hungry police officers. An interview.

The life goal of twins Eric and Matthew Gilbertson, 36, is to get to the top. 196 high points are on their list, in all 193 member states of the United Nations as well as in the Palestinian Territories, the Vatican and Antarctica. Although height is a relative term and some peaks are just small peaks. The spectrum ranges from Mount Villingili (5.1 meters) in the Maldives to Mount Everest (8848 meters) in China and Nepal. The brothers from the US state of Kentucky have already ticked off 135 highlights, some of them they stood together, some just one of them. What did you experience there?

SZ: Let's start with bribes: You always have to pull out a little money.

Matthew Gilbertson: We only try to bribe when we have no alternative. But in certain regions, earnest money is the lubricant to be let through at border posts - for example in Central America or parts of Africa.

Eric Gilbertson: We often rely on local helpers because they know the situation. Once when I wanted to go from South Africa to Zimbabwe, they said to me: "Put a \$100 bill in your passport and you can cross the border." But I had no more money.



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What happened?

Eric: The woman at the counter looked at me very, very confused. A local helper convinced them over the phone to let me into the country anyway. But that was not the end of the matter.

Why?

Eric: In the car I was stopped by a police officer who said I was speeding. It was clear that he wanted money, but I didn't have any anymore. I told him, "All I have left is this packed lunch." He looked in and said, "Okay, I guess you can go."

So one of your takeaways from traveling is to pack some extra cash for certain countries?

Eric: Exactly. And: Only put a fraction of your money in your wallet. Because if you show the content to the police, it's gone. That's why we like to use local drivers when we travel. They know who needs to be given how much. That saves a lot of money in the end... (laughs)

Matthew: ... and yet it doesn't always work. In Sri Lanka there is a military installation at the highest point in the country. They let me through thanks to a bribe. When Eric wanted to go up later, he turned it down. Sometimes it just takes luck.

Do you prefer to travel to so-called safe countries?

Matthew: The benefit is obvious: you know exactly where you stand. In countries where corruption thrives, the situation is not so clear. On the other hand, bribing the right people clears the way as well. These are simply two different approaches. And you have to say: Only in very few countries do we have to resort to money, maybe in five percent of the cases.

Which highest point will be almost impossible to reach despite all the tricks?

Eric: The one in Bhutan. Mountaineering is banned in the country for religious reasons. There are also three or four countries in which the highest point is used by the military - for example in Cyprus or Oman. We got flashed off at the entrance to the facilities.

You declared this in your list of all climbs.

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Matthew: We want to be honest, so we really do everything we can to be on the highest point. Accordingly, we often prepare for a trip for weeks. In Saint Kitts and Nevis we thought we had reached the top, then realized we were on the wrong side of the crater. For eight hours we fought our way through the bush to the other side. We were exhausted, our clothes were torn. When we got back to the car, the police were waiting for us. But then she quickly realized that we were actually trekking.

Are you actually always sure that you are standing on the highest point?

Eric: In some countries - West Africa for example - no one has ever climbed the highest point before us. We therefore have some equipment with us to be able to determine the highest point. I had to do that for Togo, Gambia or Guinea-Bissau.

In the very high mountains, you usually do without additional oxygen. Why?

Eric: We try to do everything ourselves, only hiring a guide when the law requires it. We taught ourselves how to <u>climb</u>, travel as cheaply as possible, sleep in tents. And it's true, we're trying to get up without artificial oxygen. I was on the K2 in the summer without this help.

Matthew: We want to be as independent as possible. We consider this to be the most honest way of mountaineering. But there are limits. We want to climb Mount Everest next year. To increase my safety, I'll probably go up on artificial oxygen, but Eric won't.

Eric: Because I'm getting a little better at acclimatizing to the altitude.

Eric, you were at the highest point in 131 countries, Matthew in 97. Why the difference?

Matthew: I have two children, Eric none. He teaches and has summer off, I don't.

Eric: I'm a teacher so I can have summer off and get top marks.

How did you actually come up with the idea?

Matthew: We did a lot of camping and trekking with the family. As teenagers we tried to climb all the local highest points, then those in the US states came along and with that came the idea of going out into the world.

Eric: That's why we loved going to international conferences as students. We could travel for free and collect the highest points. That's how it all started. After our engineering master's degree and before our doctoral studies, we took the summer off and toured Europe by bike, climbing one highest point after the other.

Matthew: I don't have that much time with my job and family anymore. That's why I make trips of a maximum of one week, in which I try to reach as many highest points as possible.

Sounds like stress.

Matthew: Our definition of a vacation isn't lying on the beach. Our vacations were successful when we were at the highest point. (laughs)

Do you only see the highest point or also the land around it?

Eric: We always schedule some extra time because things often don't go according to plan. And especially on large expeditions with long acclimatization times, there is always room for improvement.

How much risk are you taking?

Eric: We're preparing as diligently as possible to minimize risk. In 2019 I was in Afghanistan, the region was mined and the Taliban were there. Thanks to the help of local people, I was able to avoid mines and the Taliban. On the very high mountains I work together with a meteorologist. I then know the best time windows for the ascent. This has paid off several times.

Matthew: My priority from the beginning of the project was getting home safely. Nothing changed about that. Incidentally, I'm usually the most relaxed when we've arrived on the mountain. I often find traveling there to be more risky.

Have you ever feared for your life on the mountain?

Matthew: When we were standing on the Dufourspitze in Switzerland, there was a lot of lightning. That was scary...

Eric: ... but we haven't had a really serious accident yet, apart from frozen fingers in Kyrgyzstan, but fortunately they recovered.

How do the locals actually react to your adventures?

Matthew: Not everyone shares our fascination. I remember the taxi driver in the West Bank. He just couldn't understand why I wanted to get to that point because he didn't think there was anything to see.





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
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
